



**Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students Under the  
Coronavirus AID, Relief, and Economic Security  
(CARES) Act**

**PUBLIC DISCLOSURE – December 31, 2020**

The federal stimulus legislation known as the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (“CARES ACT”), Pub. L. No. 116-136, signed into law by the President on March 27, 2020, includes relief to institutions and students for costs associated with the Coronavirus emergency. Specifically, the CARES Act established the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (“HEERF”). Under the HEERF, the U.S. Department of Education (“ED”) allocates formula grant funds to institutions. Institutions, in turn, must use at least 50% of this funding to provide emergency financial aid grants to students for expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to Coronavirus. NETTTS provides this disclosure in accordance with ED’s May 6, 2020 guidance regarding HEERF reporting.

1. New England Tractor Trailer Training Schools of Massachusetts and Connecticut (“NETTTS”) have signed and returned to the ED the Certification and Agreements for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students. NETTTS intends to use no less than 50% of the funds received under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.
2. The total amount of funds that the institution will receive from the Department pursuant to the institution’s Certification and Agreement for Emergency Student Financial Aid Grants is:

6. NETTTS used the following method to determine which students would receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act. To be eligible for Emergency Financial Aid Grants, the student:
- A. Must have been enrolled in one of NETTTS' Title IV approved programs (CDL600 or HVACR Technology) prior to March 27, 2020;
  - B. Must have been registered as "ACTIVE" status on March 27, 2020;
  - C. Must meet federal eligibility requirements to receive Title IV funding;
  - D. Must complete an Application for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students Under the CARES Act and present it to the NETTTS financial aid office.

NETTTS used the following method to determine how much Emergency Financial Aid Grant funding students would receive under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act:

- A. NETTTS determined that its Emergency Financial Aid Grant amounts would have two components;
  - i. Base Grant; and
  - ii. Additional Need Based Grant
- B. The metrics in the Awarding Schedules below were applied to each eligible student to determine the individual's Base Grant and Additional Need Based Grant.
- C. An eligible student that receives a Base Grant of \$0 nonetheless will or did receive an Additional Need Based Grant based on the Awarding Schedule below.
